This term will be looking at and learning about the changes in the weather. We will be exploring ice and what happens to it when it melts. We would also love it if it snowed!




Book Start Packs

Sharing books, stories and rhymes everyday helps your child to become a confident and eager learner even before they start school. Book Start is a national initiative aimed to inspire a love of reading and allows book packs to be gifted to every two and three year old in the country. Follow up research from the project suggests that engaging families at an early stage has long term benefits with families, maintaining children's enthusiasm for literacy as they grow older.

Every 3 year old born between 1/9/12 – 31/10/13 attending the pre-school will have received their book start packs now.

Letter and Sounds

At pre-school we focus on Phase One and over the school year we plan regular activities to support the 7 different aspects through child and adult led activities.

Each aspect is divided into 3 strands and develops children's ability to:

- Listen to sounds
- Listen and remember
- Talk about sounds

This terms aspect is **Body percussion** and aims to develop children's awareness of sounds and rhythms.

Why not use the outdoors to encourage children to explore different ways of making sounds with their bodies Encourage your child to stop and listen when they march, stamp, clap hands or splash in puddles.

SPEEDY BIRD CAKE



RSPB- Bird Watch – an activity to give nature a home on your door step. We will be making bird cake at school to encourage the birds into our garden, why not give it a go at home. We will also be putting up new bird boxes to encourage the birds to nest in our garden .

Things you need

Good quality bird seed; raisins; peanuts; grated cheese; suet or lard; yoghurt pots; string; mixing bowl; scissors

1.Carefully make a small hole in the bottom of a yoghurt pot. Thread string through the hole and tie a knot on the inside. Leave enough string so that you can tie the pot to a tree or your bird table



2.Allow the lard to warm up to room temperature, but don't melt it. Then cut it up into small pieces and put it in the mixing bowl

3. Add the other ingredients to the bowl and mix them together with your fingertips. Keep adding the seed/raisin/cheese mixture and squidding it until the fat holds it all together.

4.Fill your yoghurt pots with bird cake mixture and put them in the fridge to set for an hour

5.Hang your speedy bird cakes from trees or your bird table. Watch for greenfinches, tits and possibly even great spotted woodpeckers.

Important notes

Not suitable for children with nut allergies. Note that bird seed, including peanuts bought for birds, is not suitable for human consumption.

Other ways to help !! Remember to put water out in the garden

Birds need water for drinking and bathing. Water is particularly important during the winter when natural supplies may be frozen.
